PAW Scotland Bird of Prey Crime Hotspot Maps 2011-2015

Maps

Map 1: Bird of prey poisoning incidents in Scotland 2011-2015 shows the distribution of incidents of confirmed poisoning abuse reported to Science and Advice for Scottish Agriculture (SASA) from January 2011 to December 2015.

Map 2: Bird of prey poisoning incidents in Scotland 2015 shows the distribution of incidents of confirmed poisoning abuse reported to SASA for 2015 only.

Map 3: All bird of prey crimes recorded in Scotland 2013-2015 shows the distribution of all criminal incidents involving a bird of prey species recorded by Police Scotland from January 2013 to December 2015.

Map 4: All bird of prey crimes recorded in Scotland 2015 shows the distribution of all criminal incidents involving a bird of prey species recorded by Police Scotland for 2015 only.

Map 5: Other poison baits, Scotland, 2011-2015 shows the distribution of poison abuse incidents involving the discovery of baits (and associated non-raptor species) only. The purpose of this new map is to highlight incidents which posed a significant threat to birds of prey, even where none were actually confirmed poisoned.

The maps show incidents where birds of prey have been confirmed as victims of poisoning, shooting, illegal trapping, nest destruction, disturbance or other types of crime. Where several incidents have been reported for the same area, the number of incidents has been aggregated to show 'hotspots'; the greater the number of incidents the larger the 'spot'.

For the maps showing wider persecution, new data will be added each year, until it is possible to show five years on one map, as with the poisoning incidents.

Note: Details of five 2015 crimes (or suspected crimes), including one poisoning incident, have been withheld for police operational reasons. The location of these incidents therefore cannot be included on the hotspot maps at the time of publication. However, the crimes are included in the totals published in the summary tables in this booklet. Details of an additional suspected 2015 incident were received by Police Scotland shortly before publication of the maps and background data. If, upon investigation, this incident is recorded as a crime by Police Scotland, it will be included in future PAW publications.



Tables

Please note that the number of poisoning **incidents** does not indicate the number of birds poisoned. For a summary of the number of birds of prey poisoned over this period please see Table 1.

Tables 2a and 2b show a summary of all the bird of prey crimes recorded in 2013-2015 by species involved, and by type of crime. As it may not always be possible to quantify the number of birds affected by, for example, a case of disturbance, this table shows the number of recorded crimes. Tables 3a-3c provide a year by year breakdown of these recorded crimes.

Some of the poisoning incidents also involved the recovery of poisoned baits and poisoned corvids, along with the carcasses of the birds of prey that were poisoned. A full detailed account of each incident is available in Tables 4a-4e.

Tables 5a-5c provide further details of each recorded bird of prey crime between 2013 and 2015 respectively.

Following a request from the Rural Affairs, Climate Change and Environment Committee, PAW Scotland investigated the possibility of producing an additional map showing the location of poisoned baits which were not already linked to a confirmed bird of prey poisoning. A new map (Map 5) has therefore been included, showing the distribution of such incidents, based on the following criteria:

- Incident classed as abuse by SASA
- Not associated with a known raptor poisoning abuse incident already displayed on the poisoning maps
- Type of poison likely to be lethal to raptors
- Type of bait attractive to raptors
- Placed in an exposed, outdoor, location.


Background details of the incidents included in this new map are available in Table 6.

The inclusion of another map showing locations of illegal traps targeted at raptors, but which had not actually caught a raptor, was also considered. However, as the existing recorded crime maps already include incidents recorded by Police Scotland as attempted raptor trapping offences, it was not thought there was sufficient value in publishing a further map showing these incidents separately.




Bird of Prey Poisoning Incidents Scotland - 2011 - 2015








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
